A Business Meeting of the South Carolina Workers' Compensation Commission was held in Hearing Room A of the Workers' Compensation Commission on Monday, December 16, 2019, at 10:30 a.m. The meeting agenda was posted prior to the meeting and proper advance notice was made to all concerned parties in compliance with requirements in the Freedom of Information Act. The following Commissioners were present:

David Durant, Staff Attorney and Bonnie Anzelmo, Injured Workers Advocates were also present.

Chairman Beck called the meeting to order at 10:48 a.m.

AGENDA

Commissioner Barden moved that the agenda be approved. Commissioner McCaskill seconded the motion, and the motion was approved.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES – BUSINESS MEETING OF NOVEMBER 17, 2019

Commissioner Barden moved that the minutes of the Business Meeting of November 17, 2019, be approved. Commissioner Taylor seconded the motion, and the motion was approved.

GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS

Mr. Cannon reminded the Commissioners that the annual holiday luncheon would be held immediately following the meeting.

APPLICATIONS FOR APPROVAL TO SELF-INSURE

Self-insurance applications were presented by Emily Boggs, Self-Insurance Director. Seven (7) prospective members of Two (2) funds was presented to the Commission for approval. The applications were: South Carolina Home Builders SIF BL Wiggins Enterprises, LLC Palmetto Development Custom Homes, LLC Pawleys Island Carpentry, LLC Premier Gutters Installation and Repair, LLC William T. Ruarks dba Ruacon Quality Construction Wolf Construction Co., Inc.

South Carolina Municipal Insurance Trust Fund Town of Jefferson

After examination of the applications, it was determined that each complied with the Commission's requirements and each was recommended for approval. Commissioner Wilkerson made the motion to approve the applications to self-insure, and Commissioner Barden seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

DEPARTMENT DIRECTORS' REPORTS

The Department Directors presented their reports which were also submitted to the Commission in written form.

Human Resources

Ms. Stuart presented the Human Resources report. Ms. Stuart pointed out the following highlights from the report:

- November is statistically slow due to the holiday.
- We had 2 personnel changes.
- Ms. Stuart attended the first revised Training and Development Consortium. Ms. Stuart states that she believes it will be great for the state and employees.
- Parking and building issues are trending down.
- Approved 25 travel reports; those numbers are higher due to the KERMIT travel.

Information Technology Department

Gary Cannon presented the IT report, in Ms. Sprang's absence. Mr. Cannon provided the following highlights from the report.

Accomplishments in November:

- We are continuing to process EDI 3.0 transactions through Progress. It is our expectation to implement XML 3.1 post KERMIT implementation.
- Progress-Continuing to use Progress to receive and record documentation.
- Completed implementing our helpdesk and it has been integrated into KERMIT and it helps stakeholders know where their request is.
- Extracting documents from OnBase into KERMIT. All documents submitted are being scanned into OnBase so they can be migrated into KERMIT.
- Legacy Modernization Project-working with stakeholders with any issues and stakeholders are reporting that the system is working. There a few issues and we are working to communicate with the stakeholders.
- Also, we are in the process of developing some training videos to assist users on how to enter claims, filing pleadings etc.
- Several training manuals have been developed and primarily assist with

registration. The manuals are posted on the website.

Insurance and Medical Services Department

Mr. Ducote presented the Insurance and Medical Services Department's report. Mr. Ducote pointed out the following highlights from the report:

- In November, the Compliance Division compelled 43 employers to come into compliance with the Act and collected over \$120,000 in non-compliance penalties. As a result of the efforts 241 more employees are now covered.
- All 16 carriers on the Rule to Show Cause docket resolved their outstanding fines. Resulting in \$5,500.00 in fine resolutions.
- Coverage collected \$10, 000 in fines.
- Total 1,820 new claims have been established.
- Self-Insurance collected \$67,777 in self-insured fund.

Claims Department

Ms. Spann presented the Claims Department's report. Ms. Spann reported the following for the month of November:

- In preparation for the go dark period, Claims process 4,000 less claims than last month.
- Claims closed 1, 7000 files and reviewed 2,100 files.
- Fine revenue collected was \$5,000 less than the previous month.
- There was an increase of 94 in the number of fines assessed for form 18's.
- EDI was cut off during the dark period and it's back up; the EDI transmissions were less than last month.
- Email and mailed claims were down due to the deadline to file claims during the go dark period.
- Claim received 14 Third party settlements were received and 12 were approved.

Judicial Department

Ms. Bracy presented the Judicial Department's report. Ms. Bracy reported the following for the month of November:

- Judicial is holding steady in their numbers
- Numbers are a little down due to the dark period before KERMIT go live.
- Ms. Bracy and WCC's General Counsel, Keith Roberts attended Mr. Lacy's law class.

VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION

Mr. Cannon presented the Vocational Rehabilitation report. Mr. Cannon reported the following:

- The monthly report submitted has the numbers and also include a few for the month of December.
- Ms. Drawdy is no longer with Vocational Rehabilitation. We have been assigned a new counselor who will assume her duties after the first of the year.

Commissioner Taylor inquired about if we have considered having a Vocational Rehabilitation counselor on staff. There was discussion.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Gary Cannon, Executive Director, presented his report which was also submitted to the Commission in written form. He pointed out the following highlights from the report:

- The Executive Team spent most of their time on the launch of KERMIT.
- In November the team was training in various sections around the state.
- We had almost 800 stakeholders attend the KERMIT training.

ADMINISTRATION – FINANCIAL REPORT

Gary Cannon, Executive Director presented the Financial Report. Mr. Cannon pointed out the following highlights from the report.

- Benchmark for this period is 32%.
- Total number of expenditures is 25% of what is budgeted, which is substantially lower than the benchmark.
- Earmark fund is 42%, which is slightly higher than the benchmark.

NEW BUSINESS

Average Weekly Wage:

The new calculated average weekly wage that was certified by the SC Department of Employment and Workforce for July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2019 is \$866.69. Mr. Cannon requested the Commissioners to pass a motion to adopt the average weekly wage.

Commissioner McCaskill made the motion to approve the Average Weekly Wage, and Commissioner Barden seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved. All Commissioners signed the order after the meeting.

SUBJECT: Monthly Human Resources Report for January 2020 Business Meeting

This report summarizes the activities of Human Resources during the month of December 2019. December was a short month with the 3 holidays and annual leave. Although it was a short month, it was active with 156 administrative transactions, benefit questions and leave time transactions.

In December the Commission had 53 FTE positions available. We have 1 part-time employee. As part of the IT Legacy System Modernization Project Phase 2 we recruited a temporary Application Support Analyst through Beeline, the State's IT temporary recruitment vendor. The position will be used for six months to assist with the completion of the KERMIT release and begin with Phase 2. We reviewed 24 candidates and selected 5 for phone interviews which were scheduled for early January. This position has since been filled.

- New Hires: None
- Separations or Retirements: None
- Leaves: 4

There were 9 benefit-related issues in December which was up by 3 in November.

We had 2 celebratory employee luncheons in December. The first was to acknowledge the "go live date" for Kermit and the second was our annual Christmas luncheon.

We sent 25 "All Agency" emails during the month. That number is 10 more than last month.

There were 4 HR-related transactions processed in SCEIS which was significantly down from prior months. There were 13 time-related SCEIS transactions processed in SCEIS. Payroll and time reports were run as scheduled. There were 16 travel expense reports processed.

The State HR Division has requested all agency HR departments to clean up and close out old job listings in NEOGov, which I completed. We had many uncompleted assignments from prior years going back to when the system was first implemented. The goal is to be able to use the NEOGov system to accurately collect data, such as the number of days it takes to fill a specific position or the number of candidates that apply and are considered.

We had 4 CBRE building issues and 3 parking transactions. Our building related and parking issues continue to trend downward.

This report summarizes the activities and accomplishments of departmental projects and initiatives for the IT department during December 2019.

I. Systems Operations, Maintenance and Support

EDI

We are continuing to process EDI 3.0 transactions through Progress and will transition to XML 3.1 in March. We are starting to migrate the First Report of Injury filings from 3.0 into KERMIT and we will repeat this process periodically until XML 3.1 is implemented.

Progress

We are continuing to utilize Progress to record the receipt of paper documents for internal processes. This is allowing us to get open claims that were created in Progress with critical filing deadlines through the business process.

Systems Support

Jason has worked with CourtCall to get one of the hearing rooms completely configured to utilize this service.

OnBase

We are still extracting documents from OnBase and preparing them for import into KERMIT. Additionally, all forms, pleadings and documents submitted via paper are being scanned into OnBase so that all internal users have access to them.

II. Projects, Enhancements and Development

Legacy Modernization

All efforts continue to be focused on KERMIT in the following areas:

- Onboarding and registration of external users
- Continuity of business operations which includes data synchronization between Progress and KERMIT as functionality is released in a phased approach
- KERMIT data integrity and management
- Functionality reviews and testing
- OnBase document migration
- Stabilization and synchronization of testing and production environments
- Implementation of security products

Employer Rule to Show Cause Hearings and Compliance Activity

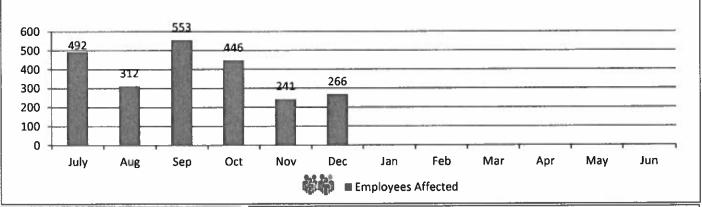
The Compliance Division docketed 2 new RTSC cases and 27 total RTSC cases in the month of December. And, compelled 39 South Carolina employers to come into compliance with the Act. Year to date, 54 new RTSC cases and 136 total RTSC cases have been docketed.

Employers Obtaining Coverage

Year to date, the Compliance Division has compelled **301** South Carolina employers to come into compliance with the Act. In so doing, approximately **2,310** previously uninsured workers are now properly covered.

Penalties Waived

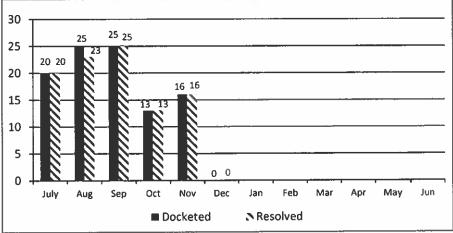
Although the Division has assessed \$4.4 m in fines this fiscal year, \$4.1 m have been <u>waived</u> or <u>rescinded</u> as employers have either obtained insurance coverage or were found not to be subject to the Act.



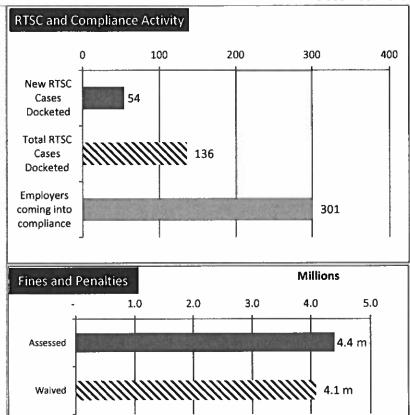
Carrier Rule to Show Cause Hearings

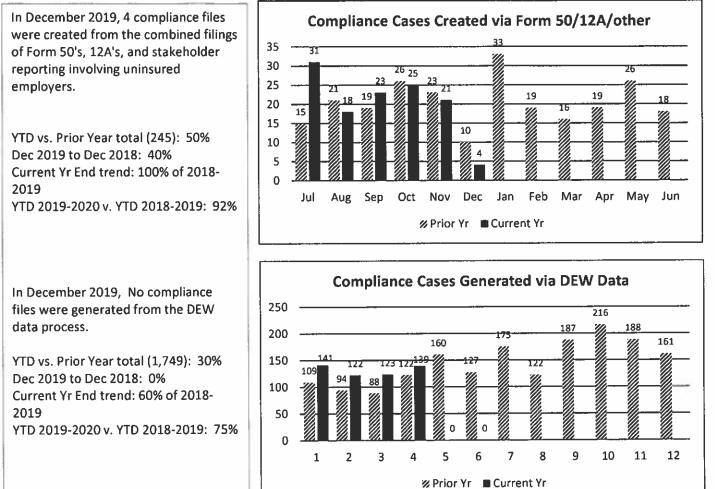
Year to date, a total of 99 carrier RTSC cases have been docketed, 97 cases for a total of \$42,466 have been resolved.



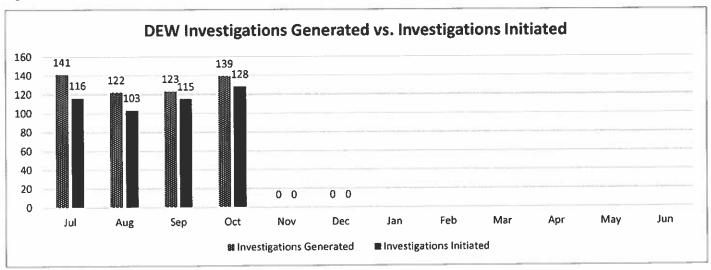

The Compliance Division closed December 2019 with 388 cases active, compared to an active caseload of 462 at the close of December 2018.

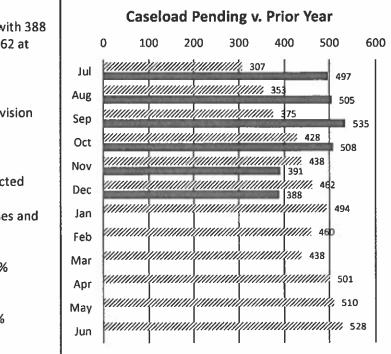
Cases Resolved:

For the month of December 2019, Compliance Division staff closed-out 15 cases.

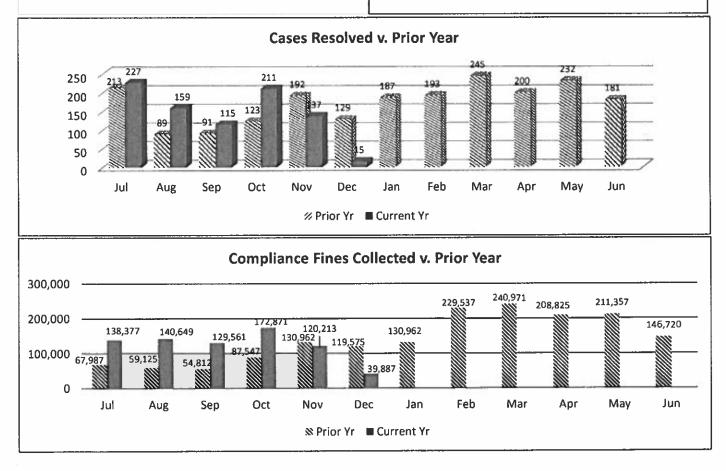
Compliance Fines:

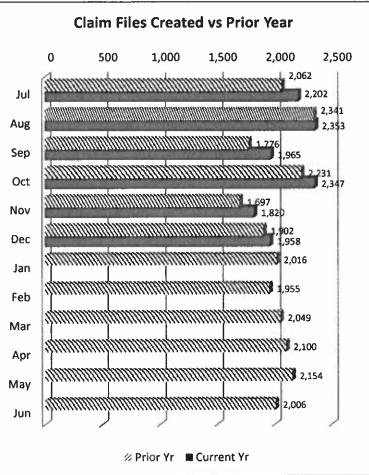

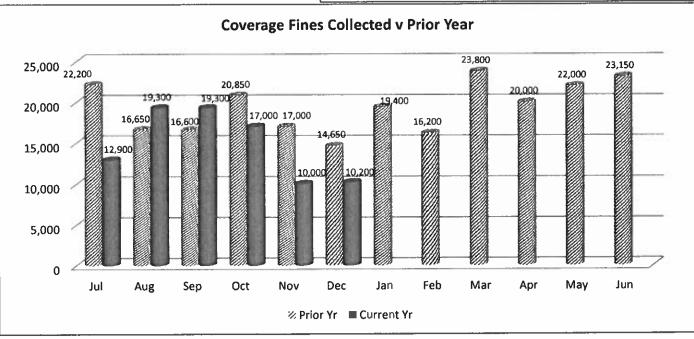
WCC Claim Files:

In December 2019, the Coverage Division received a total of 1,958 WCC Claim files. Of these, 1,885 were created through proper carrier filing of a 12A, and 73 were generated as a result of a Form 50 claim filing. Year to Date 12,645 Claim files have been created which is 52% of claim file volume prior year (24,289).

Coverage Fines:

The Coverage Division collected \$10,200 in fine revenue in December 2019, as compared to \$14,650 in Coverage fines/penalties accrued during December 2018. Year on Year, Coverage fines are at 38% of collections for prior year.



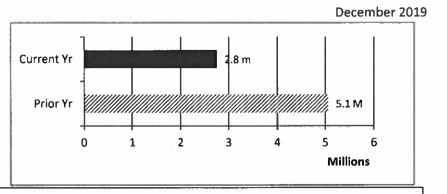


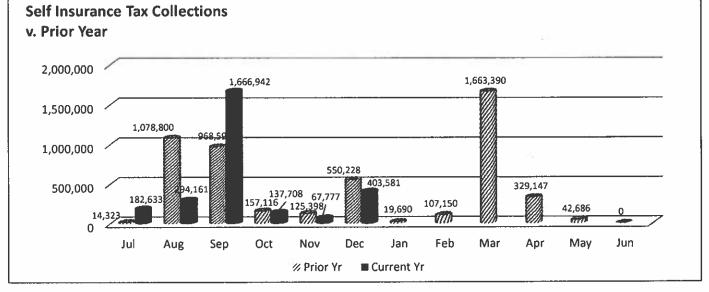
IMS SELF INSURANCE DIVISION

- * added 7 new self-insurers.

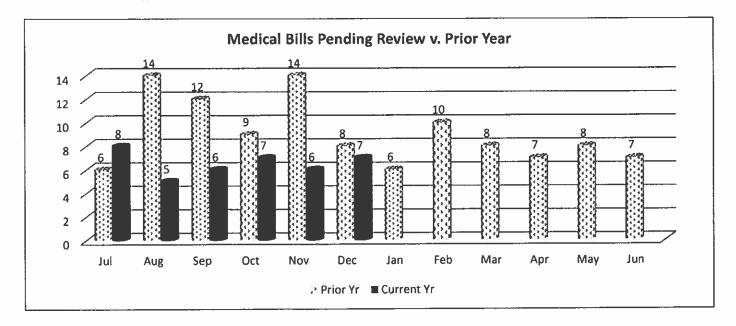

During the month of December, the Judicial Department processed five hundred twenty-nine (529) requests for hearings, eighty-five (85) Motions and one hundred twenty-nine (129) clincher conference requests that were sent to the Jurisdictional Commissioners.

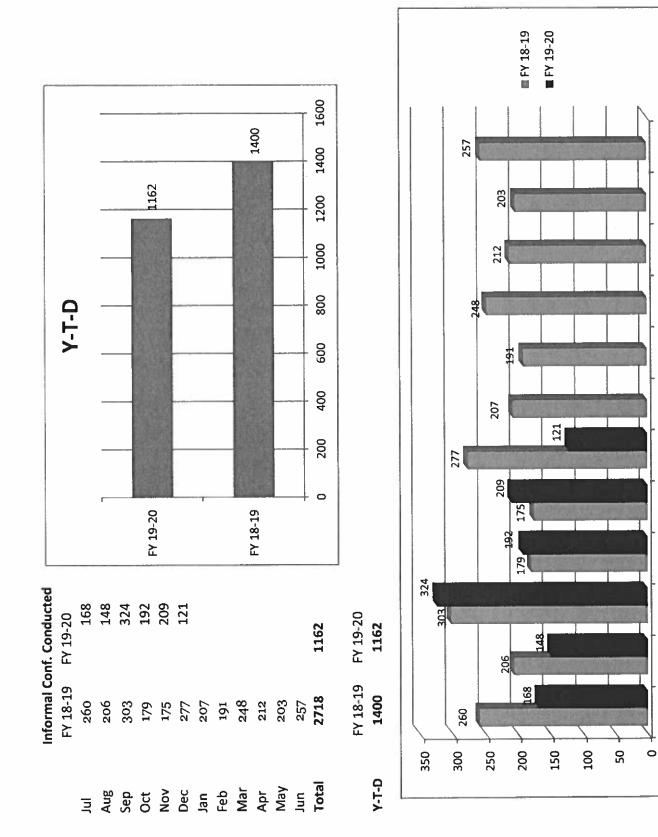
There were forty-seven (47) Single Commissioner Hearings conducted during the past month, twenty (20) pre-hearing conferences held and five (5) Full Commission hearings held. A total of three hundred sixty-nine (369) Orders were served at the single Commissioner level, thirty-four (34) of those were Decision and Orders that resulted from hearings that went on the record and eighty-three (83) were Motion Orders that were a result of Motions ruled upon by Commissioners.

The Informal Conference system conducted one hundred twenty-one (121) hearings during the last month.

There were twenty-eight (28) regulatory mediations scheduled and thirty-two (32) requested mediations. The Judicial Department was notified of twenty-five (25) matters resolved in mediation, with the receipt of Forms 70.

In the month of December, Judicial received one (1) Notice of Intent to Appeal to the Court of Appeals and zero (0) to the Circuit Court.

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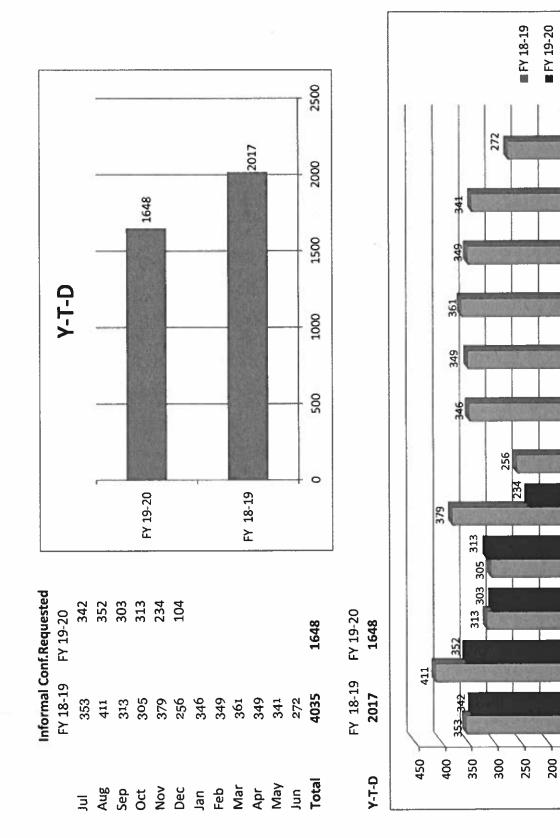
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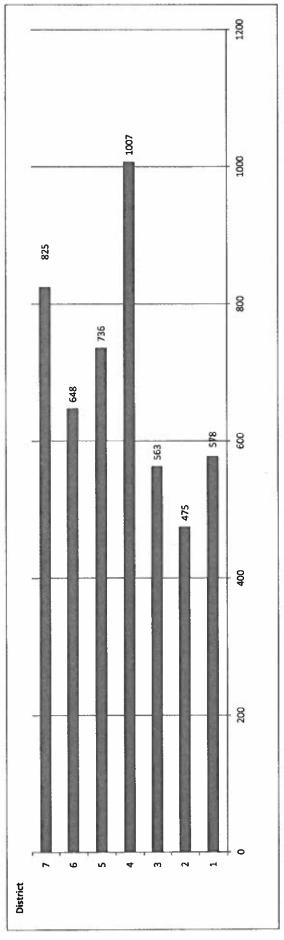

Net Present Value Tables

Pursuant to Reg. 67-1605(E)(5) the Net Present Value (NPV) Tables for weeks 101 through 500 are calculated at the yield-to-maturity rate of the Five Year U. S. Treasury Note reported by the Federal Reserve on the first business day following January 1. The regulation further states the discount rate shall not exceed six percent or be less than two percent.

The Five Year Treasury published by the Federal Reserve on January 2nd, 2020 was 1.67%. (Source:https://www.treasury.gov/resource-center/data-chart-center/interest-rates/Pages/TextView.aspx?data=yield.)

Therefore, the Net Present Value Table for weeks one through 100 shall be calculated using a discount rate of two percent (2.00%). The Net Present Value Table for weeks 101 through 500 shall also be calculated using the minimum discount rate of two percent (2.00%). The present value of the commutable weeks shall be determined based on the present value tables in effect on the date of the award or settlement.

FY2020-21 Budget

We have submitted the FY2020-21 Budget request to the Executive Budget Office and the House Ways and Means. We are requesting the same level of recurring funding for operations as in approved by the General Assembly for FY2019-20. A hearing before the House Transportation and Regulatory Subcommittee is scheduled for January 16.

RE: FINANCIAL REPORT - Period ending December 31, 2019

Attached is the Budget vs. Actual Report for the General Fund and Earmarked Fund for the fiscal year period ending November 30, 2019. The benchmark for this period is 50%.

The expenditures for the General Fund are on pages 1-3. The total expenditures in the General Fund (10010000) for this period is \$1.2 or 27% of budget. This is somewhat misleading because the total General Fund budget includes the \$1.8 million appropriation of non-recurring funds are on page 2 in Information Services for the IT Legacy System Modernization project. The Commitment items to the project to date is \$1.3 million. Adjusting the Budget to remove the \$1.8 million of non-recurring funds modifies the recurring operational budget to \$2.7 million. RE: Dominion Energy Corporate Guarantee

Effective January 1, 2019 SCANA Corporation, to include SCE&G, became a wholly owned subsidiary of Dominion Energy, Inc. and were renamed Dominion Energy Southeast Services Inc. and Dominion Energy South Carolina Inc., respectively. As a result of the merger, Dominion Energy, Inc. applied to be self-insured and was approved effective October 31, 2019.

In order to satisfy their approval contingencies, Dominion provided us with a \$3,750,000 letter of credit. Dominion is now requesting that the original SCANA letter of credit in the amount of \$3,750,000 be returned. I have no objections to this as that was the original purpose of the new letter of credit; to change the name to read Dominion Energy, Inc. and have the SCANA LOC returned.

However, due to our concerns with Dominion's liability for SCANA claims prior to the merger, we requested Dominion prepare addendums to the Corporate Guaranty. One is for Dominion Energy Southeast Services Inc. FKA SCANA and the other is for Dominion Energy South Carolina Inc. FKA SCE&G.

Mr. Roberts, General Counsel has approved the language in the attached addendums. I respectfully request the Commission approve accepting the attached addendums to Dominion Energy's Corporate Guaranty provided for their becoming a self-insured employer.

Attached are the analyses of the Medical Services Provider Manual and the Anesthesia rates prepared by the consultants Fair Health Inc.

Representatives of Fair Health will be at the February 10 Business Meeting to review their findings and respond to questions. The attached reports will be posted on the Commission's website for stakeholder's review and comment. I recommend the following schedule for the approval of the MSPM 2020 update.

January 13, 2020 Business Meeting Fair Health reports presented to Commission and distributed to stakeholders. Establish February 5, 2020 as the deadline to receive comments from stakeholders

<u>February 10, 2020 Business Meeting</u> Fair Health representatives review findings with Commission. Commission receives comments from stakeholders.

March 16, 2020 Business Meeting Commission approves Conversion Factor and proposed edits to text in the MSPM.

April 1, 2020 Effective date of 2020 MSPM.



Fee Schedule Analysis

January 8, 2020

FAIR Health appreciates the opportunity to assist the South Carolina Workers' Compensation Commission in updating the Medical Services Provider Manual (MSPM). This analysis uses medical call data (2018 dates of service) provided by the National Council on Compensation Insurance, Inc. (NCCI) and South Carolina maximum allowable payment (MAP) amounts to develop conversion factors and propose MAP values for the 2020 fee schedule.

FAIR Health received paid amounts from NCCI for the 2018 calendar year, aggregated at the procedure code/modifier level. FAIR Health used the data from 2018 to:

- 1. Develop a "fee schedule-neutral" conversion factor designed to reflect a similar level of spending based on 2019 MAP amounts; and
- 2. Project paid amounts for 2020 based on multiple conversion factor alternatives.

2018 Paid Data and Frequencies

Data Used in the Analysis

FAIR Health used the following methodology to analyze the NCCI data and project future payments based on fee schedule MAPs:

- The NCCI paid data from 2018 were used to determine the number of occurrences (frequency) for each service.
- Services were reviewed at the procedure code/modifier level to account for differences in paid amounts based on fee schedule MAP amounts and policies. For example:
 - The occurrences for codes reported with modifier 26 and TC were projected separately, based on the MAP amounts in the fee schedule.
 - o HCPCS Codes reported with modifiers NU, UE and RR were projected separately based on the occurrences in the NCCI data and fee schedule MAP values.

- Records with other modifiers or with modifiers NU, UE and RR that were appended to codes where these modifiers are not applicable/expected, were considered as though the records did not contain modifiers.
- Services containing modifiers that are paid at adjusted amounts according to South Carolina policies (assistant surgeon modifiers 80-82 and AS) were projected based on 2018 occurrences and adjusted MAP amounts. In the past, these records were removed from the database before analysis. FAIR Health believes it is more accurate to include these records and use these frequencies to project paid amounts based on the fee schedule MAPs as adjusted.

Fee Schedule-Neutral Conversion Factor- 2019 Projections

- Total dollar amounts were projected based on 2018 occurrences and 2019 MAP amounts, which reflect the 9.5% cap, where applicable.
- Based on the 2018 occurrences and 2019 MAP values, FAIR Health calculated a fee schedule neutral conversion factor for each service area. The total fee schedule neutral conversion factor is 50.2.
- Ambulance data is paid at 100% of Medicare and is not included in this analysis.
- Please see the separate analysis for anesthesia data.

Comparison of Multiple Conversion Factors – 2020 Projections

- The projections of paid amounts for the 2020 fee schedule are based on 2018 frequencies and 2020 RVUs, to which conversion factors of 49, 50, 51 and 52 were applied. The cap of +/- 9.5% of the prior year's MAP value for each service was applied, when appropriate, in providing these projections.
- The 2020 MAP values used for these projections include certain changes in how services not covered under the Medicare Professional Fee Schedule were valued:
 - If a service is not valued in the Medicare Physician Fee Schedule, FAIR Health determined whether the service was valued by another Medicare fee schedule (e.g., the Clinical Laboratory, DMEPOS or Average Sales Price fee schedule). FAIR Health used Medicare values in the analysis whenever a Medicare value was available.
 - If Medicare does not provide a professional value in *any* fee schedule for a service, FAIR Health gap filled the value using FAIR Health benchmark values or FAIR Health's FH[®] Medicare GapFill PLUS product.

- FAIR Health does not recommend that the State establish gap fill values for new codes effective January 1, 2020 that were not valued by Medicare. Setting a gap fill value before actual claims information has been received could set an inappropriate baseline against which the +/-9.5% cap would be applied in future years. FAIR Health will evaluate those codes and, based on the claims received during calendar year 2020, propose gap fill values for the 2021 MSPM.
- FAIR Health notes that the low conversion factor for the HCPCS section is driven by code G0277, Hyperbaric oxygen under pressure, full body chamber, per 30 minute interval. While this service is provided frequently, the proposed value for this service is impacted by the mandated 9.5% cap on MAP increases. The high frequency of this service, and the current low value in comparison to the MAP value that would be produced by the formula without the cap, impacts the conversion factor for the HCPCS section.

Anesthesia – Analysis of Conversion Factor

January 3, 2019

The South Carolina Workers' Compensation Commission requested FAIR Health to review the conversion factor that determines reimbursement for anesthesia services under the South Carolina Medical Services Provider Manual.

FAIR Health reviewed the anesthesia conversion factor from several aspects:

- Comparison to Medicare
- Comparison to private health insurance
 - o Billed charges
 - o Contracted amounts
- ASA survey results from 2019
- Comparison to other states' workers' compensation fee schedules

The current anesthesia conversion factor in the South Carolina Medical Services Provider Manual (MSPM) is \$30. The anesthesiology maximum allowable payment (AMAP) is the sum of the Basic MAP amount plus the Time Value Amount payment. The Basic MAP amount is set in the fee schedule based on the conversion factor x base units. The Time Value amount is calculated based on the \$30 conversion factor x each 15-minute time unit.

For example:

CPT 01380 - anesthesia for all closed procedures on knee joint

Medicare

The South Carolina anesthesia conversion factor of \$30 is equal to 135% of the national Medicare conversion factor of \$22.2016 and 140% of Medicare's South Carolina conversion factor of \$21.38. This relationship is similar to the South Carolina professional conversion factor, which is 139% of the Medicare conversion factor.

Private Health Insurance

FAIR Health collects data for anesthesia services from private payors (more than 40 payors contribute data for services performed in South Carolina) and uses this data to develop benchmarks, including benchmarks for anesthesia conversion factors. Insurers and administrators that participate in the FAIR Health Data Contribution Program are required to submit all of their data; they cannot select or "cherry pick" data to contribute to FAIR Health. We provided benchmarks for anesthesia conversion factors in two different ways:

- Charge benchmarks based on the non-discounted charges billed by providers before any network discounts are applied; and
- Allowed benchmarks based on the imputed allowed amounts, which reflect network rates that have been negotiated between the payor and the provider.

The benchmarks below are based on anesthesia services in the FAIR Health database provided in the state of South Carolina in calendar year 2018.

The benchmarks for allowed anesthesia may be compared to the South Carolina conversion factor, as the allowed line represents the amounts allowed by payors under their network contracts. This aligns to what is paid to anesthesiologists and certified registered nurse anesthetists (CRNAs) for patients covered by workers' compensation.

In this analysis, a \$30 conversion factor aligns to the 10th percentile for private insurance. That means that 90% of the values in the FAIR Health database are equal to or greater than \$30. The 50th percentile (conversion factor of \$58) is the median conversion factor value used by private insurance, and the average allowed conversion factor benchmark is \$63.

ASA Survey Results for Commercial Fees Paid for Anesthesia Services

The American Society of Anesthesiologists (ASA) publishes an annual study on conversion factors. The Commission provided FAIR Health with ASA Survey Results for Commercial Fees Paid for Anesthesia Services – 2018, and we downloaded the 2019 study from the ASA website at https://monitor.pubs.asahg.org/journal.aspx. A copy of the 2019 survey is appended to this report.

According to the publication, the ASA anonymously surveys anesthesiology practices across the country, asking them to report the conversion factors for up to five of their largest commercial managed care contracts. This study publishes the results of that survey, which are normalized based on 15-minute time units. That is the same time unit used by South Carolina in the MSPM.

South Carolina practices are included in the Southeast Region in the ASA survey. In the 2019 survey, an insufficient number of responses were received to include state-level results for South Carolina.

FAIR Health assists Colorado, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi and Oklahoma in updating their fee schedules. As we are doing for the South Carolina Workers' Compensation Commission, we provide research and analysis to support decision making. FAIR Health does make or recommend fee schedule changes.

Summary

FAIR Health presents this analysis to the Commission to assist with decision making. In summary:

- The current South Carolina anesthesia conversion factor is \$30 or 140% of the Medicare conversion factor for South Carolina and 135% of the national Medicare conversion factor.
- The ratio of the South Carolina workers' compensation anesthesia to Medicare is generally aligned with the 139% ratio of the conversion factor for other professional services (\$50) in comparison to Medicare (\$39.0896). However, the MAP amounts in the MSPM may also be limited by the 9.5 percent cap on increases or decreases each year, and the formula-based conversion factors would not be applicable to those services.
- The \$30 conversion factor is low in comparison to contracted amounts paid through private health insurance as reflected in FAIR Health benchmarks and ASA survey results.
 - The mean and median conversion factor benchmarks developed by FAIR Health, which are based on data contributions for services performed in South Carolina, are lower than the ASA survey results, which are based on up to five of the largest commercial contracts reported by anesthesiology practices responding to the ASA survey.
- South Carolina's \$30 conversion factor falls within the range of conversion factors used by other states' workers' compensation programs; however, it is on the lower end of the range.
